October Board Meeting

Due to the Club not having a quorum at the October Board meeting on October 11, the Board did not conduct any official business that night.

November Board Meeting Notes

The RVMRC Board met on Wednesday, November 8, 2006. Four board members were present among the eight Club members in attendance. The treasurer reported that the Club's finances were in good standing with income ahead of expenditures for the year. Gordon Nunnally of the National Historical Society has proposed to do landscaping along the south and west side of the Club building. Gordon said he would like to have a more accessible water source for the south side of the building, which would require an extension of the water line to the south wall of the building. Tony Johnson, who is a member of both the Live Steamers and the Historical group, would be assisting Gordon.

Jim Dougall recommended that the Club sell our surplus books at the National Historical Society table at the November Railroad Show, or the railroad swapmeet in Eugene in 2007. Bruce reported that four club members' dues are in arrears. Bruce will follow up with one of the members, continue attempts to make contact with a second, but feels two others will likely not renew. Bruce passed out copies of the new Club membership categories and rates, as approved at the October General Membership meeting.

John Gerritsma thanked Bruce McGarvey for publishing the October issue of the Passing Track during John's month long absence. Jim will get a copy of the Club's job schedule for the November train show for inclusion into the Passing Track in the November issue [this item did not occur as the November issue was combined with the December newsletter and the show has already occurred—ed.]

Jay will host another DCC clinic on Saturday, November 11. The emphasis on the clinic would be operations using DCC plus continued installation and programming of DCC decoders. After November 11, the Thursday and Saturday work sessions will be dedicated to getting prepared for the annual train show. The floor space is very tight this year and the Club has a modest 20x32 foot space.

Jay sold three Club cars on e-bay.

Jim Dougall reported that he had been contacted by Jim Curtis, Marvin Curtis's son, about the diorama that Marvin built for display at the Medford Library. Jim inquired as to the Club's interest in having the diorama displayed at the Clubhouse, but that he would "borrow" the display sometime in the future. The board approved the suggestion, and Jim will make additional contacts to pick up the diorama. Bruce reported that he will set up a display at the Medford Public Library on Monday, November 13 where it will be for 4-6 weeks.

Dick reported that Hotchkiss Manufacturing is closing *Clear Case*. This high quality product line of optical grade acrylic display cases, solid oak bases, and anti-static cleaner apparently has fallen victim to overseas competition. Clear Case has a "shelf full" of display case items for sale to club members and the public at garage sale prices. (See Walthers Catalog for photos and retail prices). Bruce presented shares of the P&E to Kadee Quality Products for their recent generous donation of Kadee products to the Club.

29th Annual Rogue Valley Railroad Show Steams to Success



A long-standing southern Oregon holiday tradition, the 29th Annual Rogue Valley Railroad Show was held at the Medford Armory on Nov. 25th and 26th, 2006. Over 4,000 railroad fans viewed model trains in a myriad of types and

sizes, along with related exhibits and displays.

This year's show was proudly sponsored and staffed by four organizations that share facilities at the City of Medford's Railroad Park: the Southern Oregon Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society, the Morse Telegraph Club, Southwest Oregon Large Scale Trains, and the Rogue Valley Model Railroad Club. All proceeds from the show fund improvements to the exhibits at the Railroad Park.

twenty model railroad layouts Over were incorporated among the twenty-six exhibits that filled the large Armory floor. In a poll of Saturday's attendees, the exhibit by Gary Johnston (Central Point, OR) was voted the show's favorite. Johnston proudly displayed a multi-level N-scale layout featuring a fanciful winter landscape, a bridge over a large river, a small town, and an airport. The large garden-scale layout operated by Southwest Oregon Large Scale Trains (SOLST), with a variety of scenes including a wedding chapel, golf course, haunted house, and amusement park, finished closely behind in the balloting. The Ashland-based Siskiyou Toy Train Club's eclectic layout featuring O-scale Lionel trains placed third.

Among other notable exhibits were two creations by John Huckaby (Ferndale, CA), including a crowdpleaser that featured a Western town scene rife with visual puns. Both the Rogue Valley Model Railroad Club (RVMRC) and the Klamath Rails club (Klamath Falls, OR) exhibited large modular HOscale layouts. Two complex and beautifully landscaped N-scale layouts by Bob Marcy (Grants Pass, OR) included close to 150 feet of track each. The White City Model RR Club displayed their Nscale line, complete with mountains, tunnels, and a harbor. Loren Snyder (Medford, OR) and the Cascade Z Modelers exhibited several Z-scale layouts, including a modular layout featuring mountainous terrain, a layout incorporated inside a briefcase, and a tiny layout cleverly mounted inside the shell of a computer monitor. Our youngest exhibitor, 11-year-old Marcus Johnson (Ashland, OR) proudly showed off his 4-by-8 HO-scale layout featuring a town and small lake.

Several interactive exhibits gave children of all ages a chance to "control the throttle", including Bryan Frazier's (Ashland, OR) Lego trains, Rick Korner's (Medford, OR) Fisher-Price trains, Art McKee's (Prospect, OR) O-scale "Switching Puzzle", and the RVMRC's popular HO-scale "Junior Pretzel" layout.

Southern Oregon is home to three premier manufacturers of model railroad equipment – Kadee Quality Products of White City, Micro-Trains Line of Talent, and Campbell Scale Models of Central Point – and the show was very proud to host exhibits that highlighted their products. A fourth manufacturer, Sea Rails of Valley Ford, CA, also displayed its products.

Other notable exhibits included a whimsical diorama created by Dick Hotchkiss (Merlin, OR) showing a G-scale logging train's bridge crossing predicament during an earthquake, and several buildings and dioramas created by the Medford Evening Miniatures club.

Several fascinating exhibits highlighted railroad history. The National Railway Historical Society's exhibit featured a mix of railroad artifacts along with information about their restoration projects at the Medford Railroad Park. Show attendees took their turn sitting in two restored speeders once used to maintain track in the mountain West. Meanwhile, the Morse Telegraph Club was busy sending free telegrams across the Armory floor or across the U.S. Visitors to the Operation Lifesaver booth could occupy the engineer's seat in a mock-up of a locomotive cab, as well as learn about railroad safety.

Hourly door prize drawings and a large showending raffle allowed many lucky patrons to take home a gift, and bargain hunters took advantage of the eighty tables of railroad-related goods offered by vendors stationed in the Armory's balconies.

Media response was excellent, with coverage by all three of Southern Oregon's major TV network affiliates and the Medford Mail Tribune newspaper. Special thanks go to Southern Oregon Public TV for their participation and promotional efforts.

Thanks to the many volunteers who helped organize and staff this year's event (including Boy Scout Troop 111), and to the over forty different businesses and individuals that donated a wide variety of merchandise and services to the Show.
